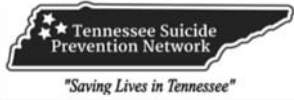

SUICIDE PREVENTION AWARENESS MONTH: A TIME FOR REFLECTION AND ACTION

The following is a message from TSPN Executive Director Scott Ridgway.

For me, Suicide Prevention Awareness Month is not only a time of awareness and educational outreach, but also reflection. It is an opportunity for me to look back on what TSPN has achieved since the last observance and where we can go next. This year has me feeling more contemplative than usual, not just because of 15 years of serving as Executive Director, but also because of all we've accomplished this year.

Our agency is fully staffed and working on multiple projects on a statewide level, from our Zero Suicide Initiative to our Gun Safety Project to our provision of resources to local emergency rooms. The passage of Jared's Law earlier this year means our staff and volunteers are working harder than ever to provide training and resources to school districts and employees. We continue our forays into the field of social media, and our redesigned website and messaging systems will allow us to reach more people on more devices.

We have our work cut out for us. As of 2014, Tennessee experienced three suicides every day. Our staff and volunteers have been called in to provide services to no less than four schools affected by suicide deaths since August 1. The need for awareness and understanding about the causes of suicide and what to do in a crisis is more urgent than ever.

This year's Suicide Prevention Awareness Month observance includes the usual assortment of conferences, vigils, concerts, and other activities, albeit with some twists (see pages 2-3). One thing TSPN is trying to advance this year is the expansion of our annual proclamation project beyond county and municipal governments, but to mental health facilities, social service agencies, and private businesses as well. If you know of such an entity whose leaders might be interested in declaring Suicide

## LIPSCOMB UNIVERSITY MAGAZINE FOCUSES ON SUICIDE PREVENTION



The latest edition of *Intersections*, Lipscomb University's quarterly magazine for church leaders, is devoted the issue of suicide prevention from a pastoral perspective.

It features information and resources on suicide, particularly the problem as it pertains to college campuses, with a focus on the federal Garrett Lee Smith Campus Suicide Prevention Program. It provides information on the QPR suicide prevention training protocol and showcases its suitability for churches and faith groups.

Other articles in this edition focus on the connection between suicide and combat trauma, building emotional resiliency in children and youth, and proactive steps church and youth group leaders can use to prevent suicide among the groups they serve. Recommendations are also provided for consoling families and congregations affected by a suicide death.

Adam Graham, Supervisor of Emergency Diversion Services at Mental Health Cooperative and chair of TSPN's Davidson County Suicide Prevention Task Force, is among the contributors to this edition, as is TSPN Executive Director Scott Ridgway.

## MASS MEDIA INACCURATELY LINKS MENTAL ILLNESS, VIOLENCE

Almost four out of ten news stories about mental illness associate it with violent behavior towards others, a trend that has only grown more intense in the last twenty years. This biased news coverage contributes to inaccurate and dangerous misconceptions about people with mental illness.

Researchers at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health sampled 400 news stories on mental illness which ran in or were broadcast by any of 11 major U.S. media outlets over a 20-year period. 55% of them referenced violence at some point, with 38% mentioning violence towards others and 29% linking mental illness directly with suicide. While many of the stories reference treatment (47%), only 14% spotlight a treatment or recovery process with a successful outcome. Only 8% mentioned that people with mental illness are seldom violent towards others.

If anything, there is evidence that this trend towards sensationalizing mental illness is increasing. Of the newspaper stories studied that linked mental illness with violence, only 1% ran on the front page during the first decade (1994-2005) of the study, but 18% made it to the front page in the second, more recent half (2005-14). Connections of mental illness to mass shootings went from 9% in the first decade to 22% in the second, even while FBI statistics show that the actual number of such incidents held steady during that timeframe.

"Most people with mental illness are not violent toward others and most violence is not caused by mental illness, but you would never know that by looking at media coverage of incidents," observes study lead author Emma E. McGinty, assistant professor in the departments of Health Policy and Management and Mental Health at the Bloomberg School. "In an ideal world, reporting would make clear the low percentage of people with mental illness who commit violence."

According to a June 6 summary of the paper on the ScienceDaily website, at any given moment one out of 5 people in the U.S. has some form of mental illness, and half the population receives such a diagnosis at some point in their lives. But less than 5% of violent crime in the United State can be directly related to mental illness.
